**As articulated by His Highness Sheikh Abdullah Bin Zayed Al Nahyan, UAE Minister of Foreign Affairs and International Cooperation, the United Arab Emirates (UAE) has integrated its international cooperation and development assistance efforts into the scope of the UAE Foreign Ministry.**

Through that process, the UAE has identified the following priority areas for its international development cooperation efforts: humanitarian assistance, poverty eradication, support to children, as well as global thematic programmes such as transport and infrastructure, government effectiveness and empowerment of women and girls. This year's report outlines the UAE's enduring commitment to these focus themes - helping millions of people around the world, and reaching the most vulnerable. Some of the most notable include assistance to the displaced people and refugees affected by the crises in Syria, Yemen and Iraq, disbursements for the construction of roads, bridges and renewable energy infrastructure as well as multi-year pledges to advance gender equality and women's and girls' empowerment.

Although the UAE reports on an annual basis as part of its international community obligations, its vision is based on a longer-term horizon, driven by the UAE's goals and its commitment to the wider global agenda. The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, which outlines a strategy for implementing the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), and its corresponding principles that advance effectiveness of development and humanitarian efforts, are central to the UAE's international cooperation blueprint. As well as directly contributing to global efforts to achieve a number of SDGs by 2030, the UAE's foreign assistance will yield catalytic effects in support of other goals such as ensuring inclusive and equitable quality education and promoting lifelong learning opportunities for all; promoting inclusive and sustainable industrialisation and fostering innovation; taking urgent action to combat climate change and its impact; and strengthening the means of implementation and revitalising the global partnership for sustainable development.

As a result of the continued focus to improve the UAE's commitment to international cooperation, the last few years have seen our country recognized as one of the top global donors in various platforms. Central to this acknowledgement has been the UAE's Official Development Assistance (ODA) percentage, as compared with its Gross National Income (GNI). The year 2015 marked the third consecutive year in which UAE foreign assistance superseded the 0.7 percent ODA/GNI target, an achievement which has only ever been reached by a handful of countries.

Such an accomplishment is even more marked as the UAE moves towards celebrating its Golden Jubilee in 2021. A fifty-year horizon will provide the UAE an opportunity to not only reflect on its achievements as a young nation and a global contributor, but more importantly, to continue to build a platform for global partnerships that will deliver on the global agenda to 2030 and beyond.

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
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# UAE FOREIGN AID DISBURSEMENTS IN 2015










## BY DONOR

## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In 2015, the UAE disbursed a total of AED 32.34 billion (USD 8.80 billion) through 40 donor entities as foreign assistance in 155 countries.<sup>1</sup> Of these, 120 countries are eligible to receive Official Development Assistance (ODA), including 43 least developed countries (LDCs).


The majority, 92.0 percent, was disbursed to development projects, with 6.7 percent disbursed to humanitarian aid and 1.3 percent disbursed to charitable assistance. In addition to this, UAE donors committed AED 6.38 billion (USD 1.73 billion) in support of development projects, and AED 504.0 million (USD 137.2 million) for humanitarian assistance.

## A. TOTAL DISBURSEMENTS AND AS A PROPORTION OF GNI

The Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development's Development Assistance Committee (OECD DAC) reports each year on how donors have performed against the United Nations target of providing 0.7 percent of their gross national income (GNI) to developing countries. As a participant member of the OECD DAC, the UAE reports its Official Development Assistance (ODA) using the Creditor Reporting System.

For the third year in a row, in 2015, the UAE surpassed the UN target, giving AED 16.12 billion (USD 4.39 billion), or 1.09 percent of the country's GNI, as net ODA.<sup>ii</sup>

### EXHIBIT 1 TOTAL DISBURSEMENTS, AND AS A PROPORTION OF GNI




## B. CATEGORIES OF ASSISTANCE

As in previous years, the majority, 92.0 percent, or AED 29.75 billion (USD 8.10 billion), of UAE foreign assistance was disbursed in support of development projects. Humanitarian aid and emergency relief received 6.7 percent of disbursed funds, while charitable assistance received 1.3 percent.

### EXHIBIT 2 FUNDS DISBURSED, BY ASSISTANCE CATEGORY



## C. TYPES OF FUNDING

Contrary to previous years, the majority – 68.5 percent or AED 22.15 billion (USD 6.03 billion) – of total UAE disbursements in 2015 was given as loans to 23 countries by the Abu Dhabi Fund for Development (ADFD), and to Egypt by the Abu Dhabi Department of Finance. The remaining AED 10.19 billion (USD 2.77 billion) was provided as grants. Of the funds committed by the ADFD in 2015, 63.5 percent or AED 4.37 billion (USD 1.19 billion) were in the form of loans.

### EXHIBIT 3 FUNDS DISBURSED, BY FUNDING TYPE




## D. TYPES OF ASSISTANCE

This report disaggregates data on UAE foreign assistance according to the way that UAE donor entities disburse their funds – the six ‘types of assistance’, as described in the Introduction. In 2015, 96.8 percent of total UAE foreign assistance was disbursed for two types of assistance: bilateral assistance to governments (75.6 percent), and direct project implementation (21.2 percent).

## E. DISTRIBUTION BY SECTOR


In 2015, UAE donor entities provided assistance to projects in 19 sectors, with the largest portion, 43.2 percent, disbursed to projects in the commodity aid sector. The second most funded sector was general programme assistance, which received AED 8.77 billion (USD 2.39 billion), or 27.1 percent of total disbursements. While commodity aid was provided to 46 countries, the biggest single recipient was Egypt, with AED 13.97 billion, or 99.9 percent of total assistance in this sector. Similarly, Egypt received 84.0 percent, AED 7.36 billion (or USD 2.0 billion) of UAE funds for general programme assistance. A full breakdown of UAE foreign assistance in 2015 by sector is available in Section 2 of this report.

## F. DISTRIBUTION BY INCOME LEVEL

The World Bank ranks countries and territories in terms of their annual income levels, based on their GNI per capita per year. In 2015, 75.5 percent of UAE foreign assistance supported countries in lower-middle-income groups, AED 24.40 billion (USD 6.64 billion), while AED 4.78 billion (USD 1.30 billion) was disbursed to support 43 least developed countries.

(in AED millions and as % of total, 2013-2015)




## G. GEOGRAPHICAL DISTRIBUTION

As in 2013-14, Africa was the top recipient of UAE foreign assistance in 2015, receiving AED 25.12 billion (USD 6.84 billion) or 77.6 percent of total disbursements. Of this, 92.7 percent was allocated to Egypt. Countries in Asia received AED 6.63 billion (USD 1.81 billion), with Yemen and Jordan receiving a combined total of AED 4.18 billion (USD 1.14 billion). Section 1 and Appendix 1 provide an in-depth analysis of the geographical distribution of UAE foreign assistance in 2015.

### H. DONORS


As in previous years, the UAE Government, which is comprised of 18 federal and local government entities, was the largest UAE donor in 2015, providing AED 27.84 billion (USD 7.58 billion), or 86.1 percent of UAE total assistance. Section 5 provides a breakdown of UAE foreign assistance in 2015 by donor.

### I. SOURCES OF FUNDING

UAE foreign assistance donors receive their funding from official and/or private sources. In addition to the UAE Government, the following UAE donors have confirmed that their 2015 funding came entirely from official sources: Abu Dhabi Fund for Development, Al Maktoum Foundation, Ewa'a Shelters for Women and Children, Khalifa Bin Zayed Al Nahyan Foundation, Mohamed Bin Zayed Species Conservation Fund, Mohammed Bin Rashid Humanitarian and Charity Establishment, and the Zayed Bin Sultan Al Nahyan Charitable and Humanitarian Foundation. The remaining 15 donor entities mentioned in this report are recorded as being funded from private sources and/or private source with combination with official source. In 2015, the vast majority - 97.3 percent or AED 31.45 billion (USD 8.56 billion) - of total UAE foreign assistance came from official sources.

(in AED millions and as % of total, 2013-2015)




## J. COMMITMENTS

In 2015, the UAE committed AED 6.88 billion (USD 1.87 billion) in grants and loans, mostly to fund development programmes in Serbia, with the remainder going to 19 other ODA-eligible countries. Of the commitments, 93.4 percent or AED 6.43 billion (USD 1.75 billion) were allocated to support 20 countries eligible to receive ODA. The general programme assistance sector received the biggest share, 54.0 percent, of all commitments.


# INTRODUCTION

This introduction provides an outline of the methodology and definitions used throughout **UAE Foreign Aid 2015**.

## METHODOLOGY

The information presented in this report is based on the foreign assistance records provided to MOFAIC by UAE donor entities. In preparing this report, MOFAIC received more than 3,000 separate entries of information about funds disbursed and committed made by 40 UAE donors, including 18 governmental entities.

The information was then collated, cross-checked and classified according to the definitions outlined below, before being resubmitted to the contributing organisations for verification. External quality-control was outsourced to an auditing firm to examine the process by which the data received from the donor organisations was recorded, classified, and analysed.



## REPORTING DATA TO INTERNATIONAL BODIES

As part of the country's commitment to the principles of development effectiveness and to enable international comparison, the UAE reports its foreign-assistance programmes to the international bodies that monitor development and humanitarian aid, namely the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development's Development Assistance Committee (OECD DAC), and the United Nations' Financial Tracking Service (FTS).

### OECD DAC

When the records submitted by donor organisations have been compiled and analysed, MOFAIC prepares a submission to the OECD DAC of those activities eligible to be defined as UAE Official Development Assistance (ODA), using the Creditor Reporting System of the DAC.

The OECD DAC defines ODA as follows: "Those flows to countries and territories on the DAC list of ODA recipients (see Appendix 3) and to multilateral development institutions which: i) are provided by official agencies, including state and local governments, or by their executive agencies; ii) promote the economic development and welfare of the recipient country as the main objective; and iii) are at favorable financial terms (i.e., including a minimum element of subsidy)."

Once the OECD DAC has approved the UAE submission, it publishes the figures and compares them with the country's gross national income (GNI). This in turn creates the annual net ODA/GNI ratio for the UAE, and so defines the nation's ranking in the list of international donor countries that report their foreign aid activities to the OECD DAC.

The UAE's response to humanitarian emergencies is reported to the United Nations' Financial Tracking Service (FTS), a real-time database of such emergencies, managed by Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA). Unlike ODA reporting to the OECD DAC, which happens annually, UAE humanitarian aid is reported by MOFAIC to FTS as soon as it has been confirmed by the concerned UAE donor entity and delivered to the recipient country.

## THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN ODA AND UAE FOREIGN ASSISTANCE

With the exception of Exhibits 1-3 in the Executive Summary, which compare the UAE total foreign aid with its ODA, and Section 3, which provides a more in-depth analysis of the UAE ODA, all numbers in this report relate to the wider definition of UAE foreign assistance.

## DEFINITIONS

The information in this report is organised according to the standards and definitions listed in the “UAE Foreign Aid Reporting Framework”, a publication produced by the former UAE Ministry of International Cooperation and Development in consultation with the OECD that defines the basis of classifying UAE foreign-aid activities.

The Framework is designed to suit the unique context of the UAE foreign-aid sector while also being compatible with international reporting standards. A few of the most pertinent terms are listed and defined below.

## COMMITMENTS AND DISBURSEMENTS

A **commitment** is a firm undertaking by a donor organisation, expressed in writing and backed by the necessary funds, to provide specified assistance to a recipient country or an international organisation.

A **disbursement** is the release of funds to, or for the benefit of, a recipient country or international organisation – and, by extension, the amount thus spent. Disbursements record the actual international transfer of financial resources or of goods or services in kind.

Commitments and disbursements are treated separately in order to present a clear picture of aid given and received during a particular year. Although commitments are reported here, the focus of this report’s analysis is on disbursements, consistent with the way in which data is recorded with the OECD DAC.

The UAE foreign aid reporting process has been refined, in collaboration with the Abu Dhabi Fund for Development (ADFD), to include a system for tracking commitments and their respective transactions.

## TYPES OF FUNDING

**Grants** are cash and in-kind assistance for which no legal debt is incurred by the recipient (that is, they do not have to be repaid). These can include emergency humanitarian aid, charitable donations, budget support to national governments, and many types of project aid.

**Loans** are defined as concessional transfers in cash or in kind for which the recipient incurs legal debt, such as investment-related loans to developing countries, or a loan in a joint venture with the recipient.

As in previous years, all figures in this report that relate to total UAE foreign aid do not include repayments received during the reporting year against loans made in previous years. When reporting to the OECD DAC, the UAE foreign-aid data on net loans include deductions for repayments of principal on earlier loans.

## GROSS AND NET ODA

**Gross ODA** is the total amount disbursed as official development assistance (ODA).

**Net ODA** is the total amount disbursed as ODA, minus the repayments of loan principal received during the same period, with no account taken of interest. This is used by the DAC to calculate the UAE ODA as a percentage of its GNI.

With the exception of Exhibits 2 and 3 in Section 1 and Section 4, all of the figures in this report refer to gross disbursements; therefore they do not reflect repayments.

## SOURCES OF FUNDING

Foreign aid is provided either by official government sources or by private donors. In the case of the UAE, official means funds received from the federal ministries and government departments of individual Emirates. Private funds are those received from UAE residents and/or commercial entities, through UAE donor organisations.

Correct identification of the funding source is essential to establish the UAE ODA when reporting to the OECD DAC. While some UAE donors receive all of their funds from either the UAE Government, on the one hand, or the private sector, on the other, there are some whose funds come from a combination of both private and government sources. MOFAIC is collaborating with these organisations to establish systems to record this distinction. In cases where this has not yet been possible, this report has recorded such assistance as private.

## NATURE OF ASSISTANCE

**Cash Assistance** refers to any financial transfer to a recipient organisation or country in the form of cash, checks, or wire transfers.

**In-Kind Assistance** refers to any goods or services provided to a recipient organisation or country, such as vehicles, logistics support, services of medical personnel, and search-and-rescue missions. For such assistance, the equivalent monetary value of the goods or services is recorded.

## CATEGORIES OF ASSISTANCE

**Development assistance** is provided with the aim of helping to improve the economic and social welfare of recipient countries and the overall quality of life of their citizens, including through budgetary support or the construction of roads, hospitals, and schools.

**Humanitarian aid** is allocated to help save lives, alleviate suffering, and maintain and protect human dignity during and after emergencies, including long-term assistance for refugees and displaced persons.

**Charitable assistance** is provided with a cultural or seasonal religious motivation or purpose, such as building mosques, supporting Hajj pilgrims, or implementing seasonal programmes during the Holy Month of Ramadan.

The assistance recorded in this report does not include military aid, although it does include development, humanitarian and charitable assistance delivered by members of the UAE Armed Forces, as well as UAE participation in United Nations peacekeeping operations and demining activities. It also includes assistance provided by the UAE police forces to humanitarian search-and-rescue operations.

## TYPE OF ASSISTANCE

This categorisation relates to how donor organisations disburse their funds. In addition to the traditional bilateral or multilateral distinction, UAE aid is also disaggregated into the following six types of assistance:

1. **Bilateral Assistance to Governments:** assistance to governments and government entities
2. **Core Contributions to Multilateral Organisations:** un-earmarked funds toward the core costs of regional or international multilateral organisations
3. **Other Contributions to Multilateral Organisations:** contributions to support the activities of multilateral organisations for a specific country, project, or programme
4. **Contributions to International Non-Governmental Organisations (NGOs):** funds, whether or not earmarked for a specific country or project, given to support international NGOs
5. **Contributions to National NGOs and Civil Society Institutions:** funds provided to the foregoing entities in their country of operation, whether or not earmarked for specific projects
6. **Direct Project Implementation:** projects carried out directly by the donor or by hiring a contractor

## SECTORS AND SUBSECTORS

The classification of aid by sector and subsector is determined by the purpose of the project or aid activity. It does not refer to the type of goods or services provided. A complete list of sectors and subsectors, including their definitions, is available in the **UAE Foreign Aid Reporting Framework** on [www.mofa.gov.ae](http://www.mofa.gov.ae). Appendix 1 provides a full list of assistance by country and sector. Below is a clarification of some of the sectors and related subsectors assisted by UAE aid.

General programme assistance refers to funds provided to the government of the recipient country with a view to supporting its overall development programmes. General budget support, a subsector of general programme assistance, refers to un-earmarked contributions to the budget of the recipient organisation or government, or support for the implementation of macroeconomic reforms such as structural adjustment programmes or poverty reduction strategies. Donors sometimes favor providing assistance as general budget support in order to reduce transaction costs and reporting requirements while also contributing to building the capacity of a recipient government. Education, health, and water and sanitation are all separate development sectors. However, if these types of assistance are provided during humanitarian emergencies, they are categorised under the humanitarian and emergency relief sector, according to the relevant subsector. Energy generation and supply refers to funds disbursed for the provision of power plants, power generation from renewable and non-renewable sources, electrical transmission and distribution, energy research, training, policy and administration, etc.

## UAE SUPPORT TO MDGS

While recognising the difficulty of narrowly defining the impact of a single UAE project, as well as the interrelated nature of the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs), each UAE foreign assistance record was attributed to just one MDG in order to avoid double-counting and ensure that a single methodology has been applied consistently.

## UAE DONORS

UAE Foreign Aid 2015 presents data from 40 donor entities from both public and private sectors, who supplied detailed information on grants and soft loans disbursed and committed over the course of the year. UAE Governmental entities constitute 18 of the 40 organisations; the entities are grouped together under the general heading of 'Government'. 'Private Sector' refers to UAE-based businesses or individuals that contribute to development, humanitarian or charity projects and initiatives, both directly and through fundraising campaigns and events.

i All figures in this report are in United Arab Emirates Dirhams (AED), with the important numbers converted to United States Dollars (USD) at the official exchange rate of USD1 = AED 3.673.

In October of 2015, H.H. Sheikh Mohammed Bin Rashid Al Maktoum, Vice President and Prime Minister of the UAE and Ruler of Dubai, launched a new foundation called the Mohammed Bin Rashid Al Maktoum Global Initiative. It is one of the largest development foundations in the Middle East region and represents the UAE's aim to achieve the targets set in the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), bolstered with an annual operating budget in excess of one billion Dirhams (USD 272.3 million).

Commenting on the launch, Sheikh Mohammed said, "The Arab region is undergoing massive challenges. We will not turn our backs on our region, we will provide our support and bring hope for our youth." He added: "The world today is facing great challenges on all levels; in terrorism, wars and mass immigration and the only solution lies in human development which can be achieved by educating people and helping them build their future."

The new foundation consolidates the work of 28 UAE organisations focusing on fighting poverty and illness, spreading knowledge and culture, empowering the community, and driving innovation. The foundation will target over 130 million people by implementing some 1,400 human development programmes across the Arab region.

Integrated human development is the foundation's focus, starting with providing the basic human needs of health and education, with a longer-term aim to develop a new generation of young Arab leaders, improving governance throughout the region and incubating innovators, scientists and researchers.

The foundation will educate 20 million children, treat 30 million people with eye disease to prevent blindness, invest two billion Dirhams (USD 544.5 million) for medical research centres and hospitals, and contribute AED 500.0 million (USD 136.1 million) for research to address water shortage issues in the region. The overall development strategy aims to establish a new culture in Arab societies based on tolerance and openness. To achieve this goal, the foundation will enable communities to live in harmony, away from extremism, ethnic, religious or sectarian discrimination.

The foundation works on integrated human development with over 50 affiliated institutions and strategic partners.














Distribution of school supplies to primary students in Santiago, Chile



# EGYPT

## UAE Assistance to Egypt (2015) AED 23.27 billion (USD 6.34 billion)

For the third year in a row, Egypt remained the primary beneficiary of UAE assistance in 2015, receiving 72.0 percent of the total for the year. The AED 23.27 billion (USD 6.34 billion) of assistance to Egypt was largely coordinated by the UAE-Egypt Liaison Office for Infrastructure and Development Projects, and represents an increase of 97.6 percent over 2014. The vast majority, AED 21.55 billion (USD 5.87 billion), was provided in the form of concessional loans.

The sectors supported by the UAE in 2015 include:

### COMMODITY AID

Over 60 percent of assistance to Egypt in 2015 was earmarked by the UAE to support the import of petroleum products for six months and provide the energy necessary for private consumption, production processes, industry, and construction.

### GENERAL PROGRAMME ASSISTANCE

The UAE provided a concessional loan of AED 7.35 billion (USD 2.0 billion) to the Central Bank of Egypt, in order to bolster the Egyptian reserve of foreign currency. The remaining funds in this sector, AED 16.3 million (USD 4.4 million), were given to support Egypt's economic recovery by increasing the government's general budget and reducing the financial deficit. The package has so far helped to promote economic stability, stimulate production and development, and create

job opportunities. In addition, the economic refresher package aimed to finance social housing and health insurance for those with limited income, and improve the state's infrastructure and energy supply. These priorities were identified on the basis of the Egyptian government's needs and development goals.

### AGRICULTURE

The UAE contributed AED 488.6 million (USD 133.0 million) for the construction of 25 wheat storage silos in 16 governorates. With a volume of 1.5 million metric tonnes, the new silos have doubled the country's wheat storage capacity, greatly reduced wastage and enabled wheat reserves of five months. The increased storage facilities will also strengthen the position of the Egyptian government when negotiating the purchase of imported wheat.

## INFRASTRUCTURE DEVELOPMENT

In 2015, the UAE helped to complete the construction of 50,000 housing units with a contribution of AED 551.0 million (USD 150.0 million). This project was conducted across 18 Egyptian governorates, targeting low-income families. Serving as urban communities and intended to reduce the pressure on major cities, the developments include mosques, commercial and recreational centres and nurseries. As well as reducing the social costs that are associated with slums, this project has provided over 230,000 construction jobs and 10,000 permanent jobs.

## WATER AND SANITATION

Through the UAE's water and sanitation projects, 141 villages have been provided with sanitation networks, serving 1.7 million people and helping to reduce the spread of water-borne infectious diseases.

## TRANSPORT AND STORAGE

In 2015, the UAE contributed AED 403.7 million (USD 109.9 million) towards fixing pedestrian crossings, AED 35.4 million (USD 9.6 million) towards building four flyovers

in areas of dense traffic. These projects benefitted three million people and were designed to reduce accidents and facilitate traffic. The UAE also helped to alleviate the public transport shortage in Greater Cairo with a contribution of 600 buses to the Public Transport Authority, serving around 18 million commuters monthly.

## EDUCATION

In 2015, the UAE supervised the delivery of 100 new schools in 18 governorates, with a capacity for 67,000 students and a total value of AED 98.4 million (USD 26.8 million). A vocational training programme has also been established in 15 governorates, targeting 100,000 trainees in 2015.


## HEALTH

In 2015, the UAE helped to complete the building and delivery of 78 family medicine units in remote villages across 23 Egyptian governorates, in order to service 780,000 people. The UAE also granted AED 9.1 million (USD 2.5 million) to complete a project that enables the production of vaccines, insulin and serums.





# YEMEN

## UAE Assistance to Yemen (2015) AED 3.34 billion (USD 908.0 million)

Yemen continues to be a major recipient of UAE foreign assistance, receiving AED 3.34 billion (USD 908.0 million) in 2015. These funds, provided exclusively in the form of grants, represent a 13-fold increase over 2014. UAE assistance to Yemen spanned ten governorates in the north and south of the country - Aden, Taiz, Lahij, Dhale, Shabwah, Abyan, Al Mahrah, Ma'rib, Hadhramaut and Socotra – and reached more than two million people.

The sectors supported by the UAE in 2015 include:

### HUMANITARIAN AID AND EMERGENCY RELIEF

UAE humanitarian assistance in Yemen is overseen by the Emirates Red Crescent relief team, through a team of 1,000 Yemeni individuals and in partnership with local and international organisations.

More than 30,000 tonnes of food assistance, valued at AED 400.0 million (USD 109.1 million), was distributed, including rice, flour, sugar, palm oil, tea, salt, tuna, beans, chick beans, lentils and dates. Emergency medical assistance with a value of AED 152.1 million (USD 41.4 million) included over 1,000 tonnes of medicine and medical equipment. Other relief items amounted to AED 145.9 million (USD 39.7 million).

### ENERGY GENERATION AND SUPPLY

Following a visit by a specialised UAE team to evaluate Yemen's energy needs, assistance in this sector focused on building new power stations, as well as maintaining and increasing the current operational capacity of several power stations in the governorate of Aden. In addition to barrels of fuel valued at AED 200.0 million (USD 54.5 million), new power stations have been built and electricity generators were provided by the Emirates Red Crescent and the Khalifa Foundation, with a total value of AED 405.2 million (USD 110.3 million).

### GENERAL PROGRAMME ASSISTANCE

The UAE's General Programme Assistance to Yemen was entirely provided to support the general budget of the Yemeni government, in order to help bridge the gap in public spending on commodities and services.

## TRANSPORT AND STORAGE

The UAE contributed AED 151.8 million (USD 41.3 million) for the rehabilitation of Aden International Airport, which is facilitating the delivery of relief items across the country, and helping to transport the wounded to receive treatment abroad. Assistance in this sector also included providing civil transport vehicles for government employees, firefighting vehicles, waste vehicles and transport trucks.

## GOVERNMENT AND CIVIL SOCIETY

The majority of UAE assistance in this sector, 98.7 percent, was provided to support the administrative policies of the public sector, including restoration of internal security through the rehabilitation and maintenance of 11 security institutions, including police stations, coast guard centres, and inspection buildings.

## HEALTH

The UAE's Health assistance to Yemen in 2015 included the rehabilitation of Aden Hospital by the Emirates Red Crescent, establishment of a National Cancer Centre in Sana'a, and payment of physicians' salaries at the Sheikh Khalifa Hospital in Socotra.

## EDUCATION

UAE activities in this sector included the rehabilitation of 154 schools, an amount representing approximately 14 percent of the total schools out of service; as well as the provision of equipment, with a total value of AED 80.7 million (USD 22.0 million).


## WATER AND SANITATION





# JORDAN

## UAE Assistance to Jordan (2015) AED 847.1 million (USD 230.6 million)

Jordan was the third largest recipient of UAE assistance in 2015, receiving a total of AED 847.1 million (USD 230.6 million), almost all of which, 99.0 percent, was provided as grants. The sectors supported by the UAE in 2015 include:

### TRANSPORT AND STORAGE

The UAE provided AED 470.3 million (USD 128.0 million) in 2015, through the Abu Dhabi Fund for Development, to expand and improve roads, build facilities to store oil products, support the Amman Development Pass Project, and implement offshore works to build a liquefied natural gas port.

### HUMANITARIAN AID AND EMERGENCY RELIEF

UAE assistance in this sector was predominantly provided by the UAE Relief Team and the Emirates Red Crescent, and focused on meeting the needs of the Syrian refugees in Jordan through operating and maintaining the Mrajeb Al Hood camp, providing health aid, food, various relief materials, shelter

and non-food items. The UAE also gave grants to several international organisations: AED 7.2 million (USD 2.0 million) for health projects conducted by the UN High Commissioner for Refugees; AED 5.5 million (USD 1.5 million) for the World Food Programme's food distributions at Al Zaatar camp; and AED 3.7 million (USD 1.0 million) for the International Rescue Committee's health projects.


### EDUCATION



# IRAQ

## UAE Assistance to Iraq (2015) AED 495.6 million (USD 134.9 million)







# SUDAN

UAE Assistance to Sudan (2015)  
**AED 397.6 million (USD 108.2 million)**

In 2015, Sudan received AED 397.6 million (USD 108.2 million) of UAE assistance, representing a sevenfold increase over 2014. This was almost evenly split between grants and loans, with 44.8 percent of assistance given as grants and the remainder given as concessional loans.

The sectors supported by the UAE in 2015 include:

## AGRICULTURE

UAE assistance in this sector was largely provided by the Abu Dhabi Fund for Development and used to establish the Upper Atbara and Setit Dam Complex. The Complex is expected to secure drinking and irrigation water, increase the size of agricultural lands in the region and provide additional electricity using hydraulic generation.

## GENERAL PROGRAMME ASSISTANCE

The UAE contributed AED 118.5 million (USD 32.3 million) towards Sudan's general budget in order to reduce the financial deficit and allow for expansion in education and health services as well as health insurance coverage for the poor.

## EDUCATION


In 2015, the Al Maktoum Foundation disbursed AED 4.87 million (USD 1.3 million) to support the operating costs of the International University of Africa, in addition to funding the budgets of schools run by the Foundation in Sudan. 



# MOROCCO

The sectors supported by the UAE in 2015 include:

## TRANSPORT AND STORAGE

UAE assistance in this sector was extended by the Abu Dhabi Fund for Development and largely focused on implementing a high-speed train to connect the cities of Tangier and Casablanca, with a total cost of AED 125.0 million (USD 34.0 million), and AED 37.1 million (USD 10.1 million) for the development and rehabilitation of Casablanca Seaport. The project serves as a stimulus for economic and social activities that will also help secure more than 45,000 jobs. Smaller activities in this sector include expanding the Guelmim Airport and building four logistics and land transport training institutes in Taourirt, Casablanca, Tangier and Agadir.

## WATER AND SANITATION

In 2015, the UAE provided AED 27.3 million (USD 7.4 million) to construct the Khroub Dam, which will provide the residents of Tangier and Asilah with drinking water, in addition to AED 45.4 million (USD 12.5 million) for several smaller projects to supply the cities of Khouribga, Bogor and Dakhla with drinking water.

## HEALTH

In 2015, the UAE granted AED 21.9 million (USD 6.0 million) to supply Mohammed VI University Hospital with medical equipment. The new centre has 916 beds and includes a Mother and Child Hospital and an Oncology Hospital. The Khalifa Foundation provided AED 15.1 million (USD 4.1 million) for the construction of the Sheikh Khalifa bin Zayed Al Nahyan Hospital in Casablanca.

## INFRASTRUCTURE DEVELOPMENT

UAE funding in 2015 facilitated the completion of housing units for hundreds of thousands of limited-income families in Marrakesh, Casablanca, Fes and Meknes.







## HEALTH

The UAE-Pakistan Assistance Programme and the UAE Embassy in Pakistan conducted several health projects in 2015, including: vaccinating 17.4 million children against polio, at a cost of AED 77.9 million (USD 21.2 million); providing medical equipment and maintenance services for the Sheikh Khalifa Hospital in Quetta, at a cost of AED 27.0 million (USD 7.3 million); and constructing and equipping of the UAE Hospital in Islamabad, with a cost of AED 30.4 million (USD 8.3 million).

## TRANSPORT AND STORAGE

The Abu Dhabi Fund for Development supported the construction of the Makeen-Miranshah road, which will connect

southern and northern Waziristan, serving three major cities and approximately 20 villages as well as helping to facilitate the movement of people and goods.

## EDUCATION











## HUMANITARIAN AND EMERGENCY RELIEF

The UAE Committee for Coordination of Humanitarian Aid, which coordinates and oversees UAE humanitarian projects in Afghanistan, disbursed AED 36.7 million (USD 10.0 million). The Khalifa Foundation provided fortified food to children and

infants across the country valuing AED 51.5 million (USD 14.0 million). The Foundation also provided food and supplies for winter, including blankets, clothing, school bags and tents to families in Nimroz Province.













# EMPLOYING SYRIAN REFUGEES

The UAE humanitarian aid to Syria began at the onset of the crisis in 2012 and remains stalwart to this day. During the period of 2012 -2015, the UAE provided AED 2.51 billion (USD 684.0 million) in humanitarian aid to support internally displaced people (IDPs) and refugees affected by the Syrian crisis. By doing so, the UAE has considerably exceeded amounts pledged at donor conferences from 2013 to 2015. The primary focus of UAE aid provided in response to the Syrian crisis has been building and managing camps for displaced Syrians, in coordination with international organisations.

One project that illustrates the impact of UAE’s humanitarian assistance is a co-sponsored UAE/UNHCR wastewater management programme in Zaatari refugee camp assisting 3,000 families. The project was implemented in two phases. The first provided sewage collection for each household at Zaatari, while the second installed piping that transferred sewage from communal tanks to a waste water treatment plant.<sup>1</sup>

A key feature of the programme was that it alleviated health and pest problems for the more than 80,000 Syrians who live in the camp. The sewage system brought about a significant reduction in the risk of airborne and waterborne diseases. In implementing


this project, the team utilised an innovative concept of employing Syrian engineers living in the camp to work on the sewage system. Based on their first-hand knowledge, the camp residents were able to bring about a seven-fold increase in the project’s efficiency, when production went from two blocks per week to two blocks per day.

According to a report from the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR), “The effective teamwork has been enhanced during the period of implementation especially after three Syrian refugee engineers extended valuable assistance. In addition to the fact that such an engineer team has provided their technical expertise, they have directly communicated with the refugee families and given advice on connecting their houses to the network. Since they have joined, it has become remarkably faster to obtain the refugees’ approval for connecting houses to the network.”

This example illustrates that utilising refugees’ expertise results in a win-win scenario for all parties involved, with camp efficiency increased and the dignity of refugees improved through empowerment. This project could serve as a best practice for future UAE projects.




The Commodity Aid sector received the largest portion of UAE foreign assistance in 2015, with 43.2 percent of the total, or AED 13.98 billion (USD 3.81 billion). The vast majority of these funds, AED 13.97 billion (USD 3.80 billion), were spent in Egypt, covering the country's petroleum needs, as a continuation of a commodity aid programme that began in 2013. Since this sector of activity was concentrated in Egypt, 99.9 percent of commodity aid provided by the UAE was directed towards lower-middle-income countries.


The General Programme Assistance sector received 27.1 percent of UAE foreign assistance in 2015, with AED 8.77 billion (USD 2.39 billion). The largest single disbursement in this sector was a concessional loan of AED 7.35 billion (USD 2.00 billion) to the Central Bank of Egypt. Other disbursements in this sector were given across 25 other countries, as well as contributions to multilateral organisations. Lower-middle-income countries received 84.4 percent (AED 7.34 billion or USD 2.01 billion) of general programme assistance from the UAE, while least developed countries received 10.1 percent of funding in this sector, AED 886.2 million (USD 241.3 million).

## HUMANITARIAN AID AND EMERGENCY RELIEF


The Humanitarian Aid and Emergency Relief sector received 6.7 percent of UAE foreign assistance in 2015, with AED 2.16 billion (USD 586.8 million). Of this, Yemen received AED 827.6 million (USD 225.3 million) for assistance in a number of sub-sectors, including food, health, coordination and support services, and water and sanitation. Other major recipients of UAE humanitarian assistance include Iraq with AED 272.8 million (USD 74.3 million), Libya with AED 230.2 million (USD 62.7 million), and Syria with AED 94.5 million (USD 25.7 million). In total, in 2015 the UAE provided humanitarian assistance to 43 countries as well as to multi-country programmes. Least developed countries received the largest portion of UAE humanitarian assistance in 2015, with AED 974.2 million (USD 265.2 million), or 45.2 percent of the total funds to this sector. Upper-middle income countries received AED 769.3 million (USD 209.5 million), or 35.7% of the total. Multi-country programmes received AED 297.0 million (USD 80.9 million), or 0.9 percent of the total.

## TRANSPORT AND STORAGE

The Transport and Storage sector received 4.5 percent of UAE foreign assistance in 2015, with AED 1.44 billion (USD 392.1 million). The largest projects in this sector were in Jordan, where the UAE built a complex for the storage of petroleum derivatives, and expanded and improved roads at a total cost of AED 470.3 million (USD 128.0 million); in Yemen, where the UAE provided vehicles and rehabilitated Aden international airport, at a total cost of AED 464.9 million (USD 126.6 million); in Morocco, where the UAE built a high-speed train, extended the airport, rehabilitated the port at Casablanca and established training institutes, at a total cost of AED 200.5 million (USD 54.6 million); and in Egypt, where the UAE implemented a number of improvements to public transport, at a total cost of AED 139.5 million (USD 38.0 million).


Least developed countries received over one third of the UAE assistance to the transport and storage sector with AED 521.7 million (USD 142.0 million). Upper-middle income countries received AED 485.5 million (USD 132.2 million), and lower-middle-income countries received AED 429.4 million (USD 116.9 million).

## AGRICULTURE

The Agriculture sector received 3.9 percent of UAE foreign assistance in 2015, with AED 1.25 billion (USD 340.4 million). The largest projects in this sector were in Egypt, where the UAE constructed wheat silos and purchased livestock, among other projects at a total cost of AED 598.2 million (USD 162.9 million); multi-country projects in Asia, where the UAE contributed towards land reclamation at a total cost of AED 314.4 million (USD 85.6 million); and in Sudan, where the UAE constructed dams and supported wheat production, at a total cost of AED 219.6 million (USD 59.8 million).












**BILATERAL AND MULTILATERAL ODA, BY TYPE OF ASSISTANCE**









# UAE ENABLES EDUCATION IN THE GAZA STRIP

The plight of Palestinian refugees and the work of the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East (UNRWA) remain a priority area for UAE foreign assistance. While the UAE is striving to increase the impact of our assistance by planning budgets years in advance, the UAE answers calls for emergency assistance.

In 2015, UNRWA faced a genuine funding crisis, with a budget deficit of AED 371.0 million (USD 101.0 million). If left unresolved, this deficit would have affected a number of the 685 UNRWA-managed schools that provide education to a half million Palestinian children within the occupied Palestinian territories, Jordan, Lebanon and Syria.<sup>1</sup>

When asked to help, the UAE responded to UNRWA's call by providing AED 55.1 million (USD 15.0) million in financial support for the budget deficit. This support allowed UNRWA to keep the schools open without interruption and continue the school year.

The UAE support directly affected 35 elementary schools in Gaza Strip, which employ 2,030 teachers and educate 30,000 students. Pierre Krähenbühl, the Commissioner-General of UNRWA said, "Education is considered a basic right for children in any part of the world, and we shouldn't reach the point where the school year of UNRWA becomes a situation that is threatened to be postponed due to a general budget funding shortage". He has also added, "The UAE responded to our call and provided USD 15.0 million. Without this support, we would have run the risk of postponing our school year."

In addition to this emergency assistance, the UAE provides a regular, voluntary contribution every year to the UNRWA budget of AED 3.67 million (USD 1.0 million). Additionally, the UAE is an actively engaged member of the UNRWA advisory commission.













# PREVENTING BLINDNESS IN ETHIOPIA

Ethiopia, which has a population of over 82 million, is the second-most populous nation in Africa. Overall, there are 1.2 million blind people, 2.8 million people with low vision, and nine million children aged one to nine years who have active Trachoma, an infectious disease that leads to blindness. The disease, often found in isolated communities, is easily spread from person to person through flies which seek out eyes, hands, and clothes. Repeated infection leads to scarring and inward growth of the eyelid; if left untreated, the disease can eventually lead to blindness.<sup>1</sup>

The Noor Dubai Foundation, in collaboration with the Carter Center, is taking decisive steps to prevent blindness through the treatment of Trachoma across the Amhara region of Ethiopia, the part of the world in which Trachoma is the most endemic.<sup>2</sup>

The Trachoma Elimination Programme is a three-year programme aimed at treating 18 million individual living under poverty in 167 districts across the Amhara region of Ethiopia, including more than 7,900 villages. The programme consists of four main areas: surgeries and operational theatres, medicine and antibiotics distribution, latrines and educational health programmes. On average, a single health care worker examines 495 patients per day.

Dr. Manal Omran Taryam, Board Member and CEO of Noor Dubai Foundation, explained “Children bear the highest burden of Trachoma infections and women are almost twice as likely as men to develop its advanced stage, Trichiasis, due to their role as the traditional caregivers for children who may unknowingly pass their infection on to their mothers.<sup>3</sup>

Trachoma is responsible, at present, for approximately three percent of the world’s blindness. Worldwide, there are about eight million people who have irreversible visual impairment, caused by trachoma; in addition to this, an estimated 84 million cases of active disease are in need of treatment, if blindness is to be prevented. Although Trachoma is easily preventable, the disease has blinded or painfully disabled more than two million of the world’s poorest people.<sup>4</sup>

Engineer Essa Al Maidoor, Chairman of the Noor Dubai Foundation, said: “The programme endorses the SAFE strategy recommended by World Health Organization (WHO), which included tools of intervention to control Trachoma” SAFE is an acronym used to indicate a WHO-developed strategy - a combination of interventions tools which stand for surgery for Trichiasis (inturned eyelashes), antibiotics, facial cleanliness and environmental improvement.<sup>5</sup>

The year 2015 marks the second of the three-year Trachoma Elimination Programme. The Noor Dubai Foundation has measured impact: since 2008, they have helped over 23 million people with eyesight ailments. Collaboration between the Noor Dubai Foundation and the Carter Center marks a best practice in international cooperation with strategic utilisation of strengths resulting in a noticeable reduction in the cases of preventable blindness through prevention.

Hawa Hassan, a housewife and a mother of six children in Telhurdere Warede, Ethiopia, has benefitted from the Trachoma Elimination programme, which she attributes to saving her family’s eyesight. As a result of the programme, their house now has three latrines and her family receives regular visits by a health care worker to educate them on intervention techniques that help eliminate and prevent the spread of Trachoma. Improving the hygiene and sanitation, in addition to taking their yearly antibiotic tablet, has ensured that none of her children have contracted the infectious eye disease. As such, prevention has proven to be the cure.

Hawa told Noor Dubai she and her family are thankful to the charity for preventing the spread of the disease. She said that building the latrine took 400 hours. She added that it was difficult to estimate the cost of building the latrine as money isn’t easily available and that often villagers in the area follow a barter exchange method.<sup>6</sup>










